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# **ANTI-DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2022/012**

**Exported from the Federative Republic of Brazil,  
the People's Republic of China, the Republic of Indonesia  
and the Kingdom of Thailand**

**Extension of time granted to issue the Final Report  
in relation to Continuation Inquiry No 588**

*Customs Act 1901 – Part XVB*

On 2 July 2021, the Commissioner of the Anti-Dumping Commission (Commissioner) published a notice announcing the initiation of an inquiry into whether the continuation of anti-dumping measures in respect of A4 copy paper (the goods) exported to Australia from the Federative Republic of Brazil (Brazil), the People's Republic of China (China), the Republic of Indonesia (Indonesia) and the Kingdom of Thailand (Thailand), is justified.

A full description of the goods is available in Anti-Dumping Notice (ADN) No. 2021/082. This ADN is available on the Anti-Dumping Commission (commission) website at [www.adcommission.gov.au](http://www.adcommission.gov.au).

The notice initiating this inquiry (initiation notice) advised that the statement of essential facts (SEF) would be placed on the public record by 20 October 2021. The SEF sets out the facts on which the Commissioner proposes to base his recommendations to the Minister for Industry, Science and Technology (the Minister) in relation to this inquiry. The initiation notice also advised that a recommendation to the Minister would be made in a final report on or before 6 December 2021.

The Commissioner previously approved a request for an extension to the time periods for publishing the SEF and providing the final report and recommendation to the Minister.<sup>1</sup> The *Statement of Essential Facts No. 588* was published on 17 December 2021.<sup>2</sup>

To provide further time to consider submissions received in response to the publication of the SEF, the then acting General Manager of the Anti-Dumping Commission, Justin Wickes, requested an extension of the deadline for the Commissioner to provide his final report and recommendation to the Minister.<sup>3</sup>

The Commissioner has, under section 269ZHI(3) of the *Customs Act 1901*, extended the deadline to provide his final report and recommendation.<sup>4</sup> A recommendation to the Minister will now be made in a report due on or before **4 March 2022**.
